He and all the firemen are trained in the prone pressure method of resuscitation, keeping in practice, although not often called upon to use their skill along this line.

The boy was removed to the nearest house, where warmth was applied to his chilled limbs and a physician was summoned to treat him. He was soon revived enough to be taken to his own home.
