


Daltrey: Yorkshire Family Tree

Norman Origins

Daltrey - Origin from Normandy (Hauterive) family 'de Alta Ripa'; first mention William de Alta Ripa in Pipe Rolls of Yorkshire 1166. Around 1235 Sir Geoffrey and Sir Ralph de Alta Ripa held lands in Carleton and Lothersdene, and next generation Sir Thomas married into Elsack-in-Craven. After 3 more generations there were no male heirs. The de Alta Ripa family also held lands for centuries in Full Sutton (5 miles from Yeapham). Dautry and Dawtre recorded in Yorkshire Poll Tax Returns in 1379.

London Roots

Note that the earliest record found of a Daltrey in London appears to be the 1678 Apprenticeship record cited below of William Daltrey.



Note that in the records (even of the same person) the Daltrey spelling has several variants, e.g. Daltry, Daltrie, Daultry(e), Daultrie, Daltre(e), Dautry, Dawtrie.

* Overlap with subsequent tree.
NB. James' son James was apprenticed to Thomas Bovill (lived and buried in Southwark) until 1765. Bovill is a common surname in Beverley thru the 1600s and more widely in Yorkshire.
